Arrival

Please Note: This arrival information pertains only to students arriving on August 24. Students participating in New Student Trips through College Outdoors, Student Athlete Pre-Season Conditioning, Great Expectations, or International Student & TCK Orientation will receive specific arrival information from the sponsoring/coordinating campus department.

Please plan to arrive on campus prior to the first orientation event, which begins at 4PM on Wednesday, August 24.

We will provide shuttle service to Lewis & Clark from the airport, train station, and bus station on Wednesday, August 24 from 8AM to 3PM. If you wish to use this service, please complete the electronic arrival sign-up form online at go.lclark.edu/nso before August 4.

Once you arrive on campus, proceed directly to the Templeton Campus Center to pick up your arrival packet. From there, head to your residence hall for move in.

In order to make opening an account more efficient, five local banks will have representatives on campus for one day only during New Student Orientation. This will give you the opportunity to open a checking and/or savings account here in Portland. The banks listed to the left will be on campus Wednesday, August 24 from 9AM until 3PM.

You will need the following items to open an account:

- Your current local address (your campus box number (MSC) will be sent along with your housing assignment before the end of July)
- Your cell phone number
- Two forms of ID, such as a drivers' license, state ID, and/or U.S. Passport
- Your Social Security Number

When opening an account, your initial deposit may be made in the form of cash, a personal check or a traveler's check. It is not advisable to have your residence hall telephone number printed on your checks as it is likely to change each year. Your campus box, however, will remain the same during your college career, as long as you remain at the College, and may be printed on your checks.

*Please note that U.S. Bank is the only institution that has an ATM on campus and does not charge a surcharge if you are not a U.S. Bank account holder. However, the Student Accounts office will cash a personal check for up to \$25 for you with proper ID.

All NSO leaders are available throughout the summer to answer any questions you may have and are looking forward to your arrival on campus! Don't be shy; contact an NSO leader today!

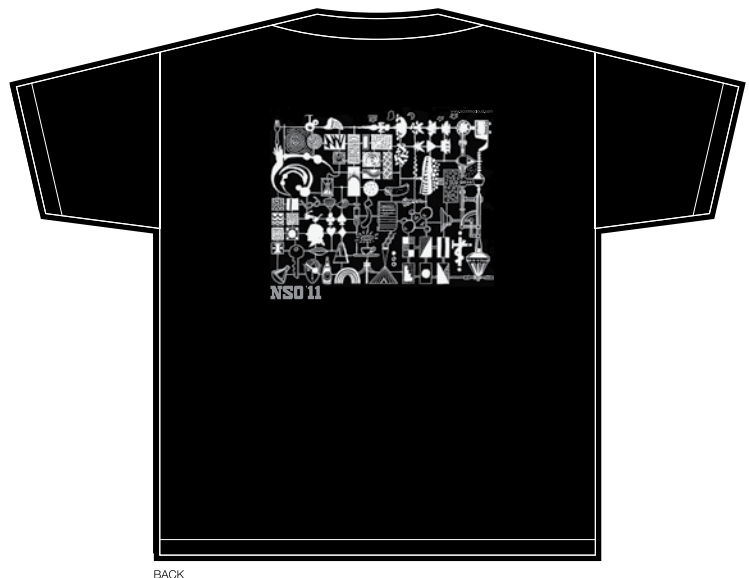
Management Leaders

Required Student Employment Paperwork

All student employment paperwork MUST be completed before you begin working!

I-9 Employment Eligibility Verification - In order to comply with U.S. Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services regulations, all students must complete an I-9 form by the first day of work on campus. Students complete this form with Human Resources. Failure to have a completed I-9 form on file with the College will result in the student's immediate removal from their job on campus. In order to complete the I-9, you will need to provide proof that you are eligible to work in the United States.

Examples of acceptable documents needed to complete an I-9 include, but are not limited to (check www.uscis.gov/i-9 for a complete list and instructions):

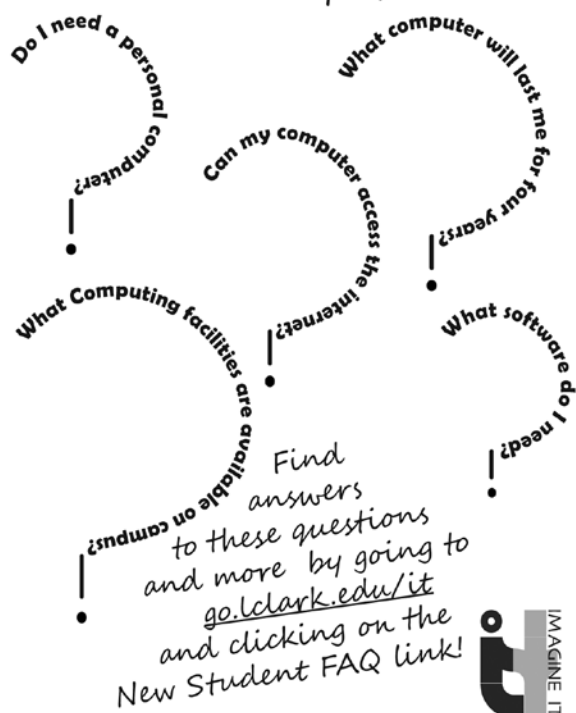
- your passport
- your drivers' license/state ID and Social Security card
- your L&C ID and a certified copy of your birth certificate

Form W-4 - This form provides tax status information so that the College can withhold the correct amount of Federal income tax from your pay. This form is provided by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service. More information can be found at www.irs.gov/w4. If a W-4 is not on file in the Business Office, the standard deduction will be single/one exemption.

Direct Deposit - You can have your monthly wages directly deposited into your domestic checking or savings account. You will need a voided check or deposit slip when you submit your form. You must complete the Direct Deposit form (available from Human Resources), and submit it to us by the 8th of the month that you wish to have direct deposit begin.

Electronic Billing (E-Bill)

Lewis & Clark is proud to provide an exclusive electronic system for delivery of student account statements. Students' Lewis & Clark e-mail addresses is used to automatically enroll them in E-Bill. E-Mail notification will be sent to students' Lewis & Clark e-mail, as well as authorized users' e-mail, each time a new statement is ready for viewing.

With E-Bill, you'll be able to do the following:

- Access the statement securely anywhere with an internet connection.
- Pay the bill online conveniently.
- Provide access to the statement easily by enabling Shared Access.

This paperless system reduces our environmental impact and allows us to provide efficient service. Anticipate viewing your fall semester statement in July.

Delivery of Student Refunds

Student account refunds will be processed after the start of each semester and only when a credit actually exists on a student account. Estimated financial aid does not qualify for a refund.

Once the semester has begun, financial aid ready for disbursement will post to student accounts at the beginning of each week. Any resulting student refunds will be processed by the end of the same week.

Dear Lewis & Clark Student,

Welcome to *Exploration and Discovery*, the College's first-year core program: you'll often hear it called 'E&D.'

This year's kick-off event – **things** – takes place on Friday, August 26, in Agnes Flanagan Chapel at 1:30PM. Attended by all E&D students and faculty, this plenary event features a panel of Lewis & Clark faculty from different disciplines: Dawn Odell, Assistant Professor of Art History, chosen by last year's students as Teacher of the Year; Cliff Bekar, Associate Professor of Economics; and Jay Odenbaugh, Associate Professor of Philosophy.

Consider a thing. Even better, consider things. What makes a thing a thing? In 1962, Wilfrid Sellars described the aim of inquiry as understanding “how things in the broadest possible sense of the term hang together in the broadest possible sense of the term.”¹ Think of all the things that count as things: the universe is a thing. All manner of objects are things. Spaces with no clear boundaries – the Mojave desert – are things. There are nonphysical things. When Tim O'Brien called his collection of short stories about a platoon of Americans in the Vietnam War *The Things They Carried*, he wasn't thinking mainly about the contents of their backpacks. Things are sometimes more – and sometimes less – than mere objects. We talk about 'living things,' but what does that mean? The Sistine Chapel isn't alive, but calling it a thing seems not to capture the thing that it is. And please never forget The Thing, that indomitable, heroic archon of Marvel's Fantastic Four.

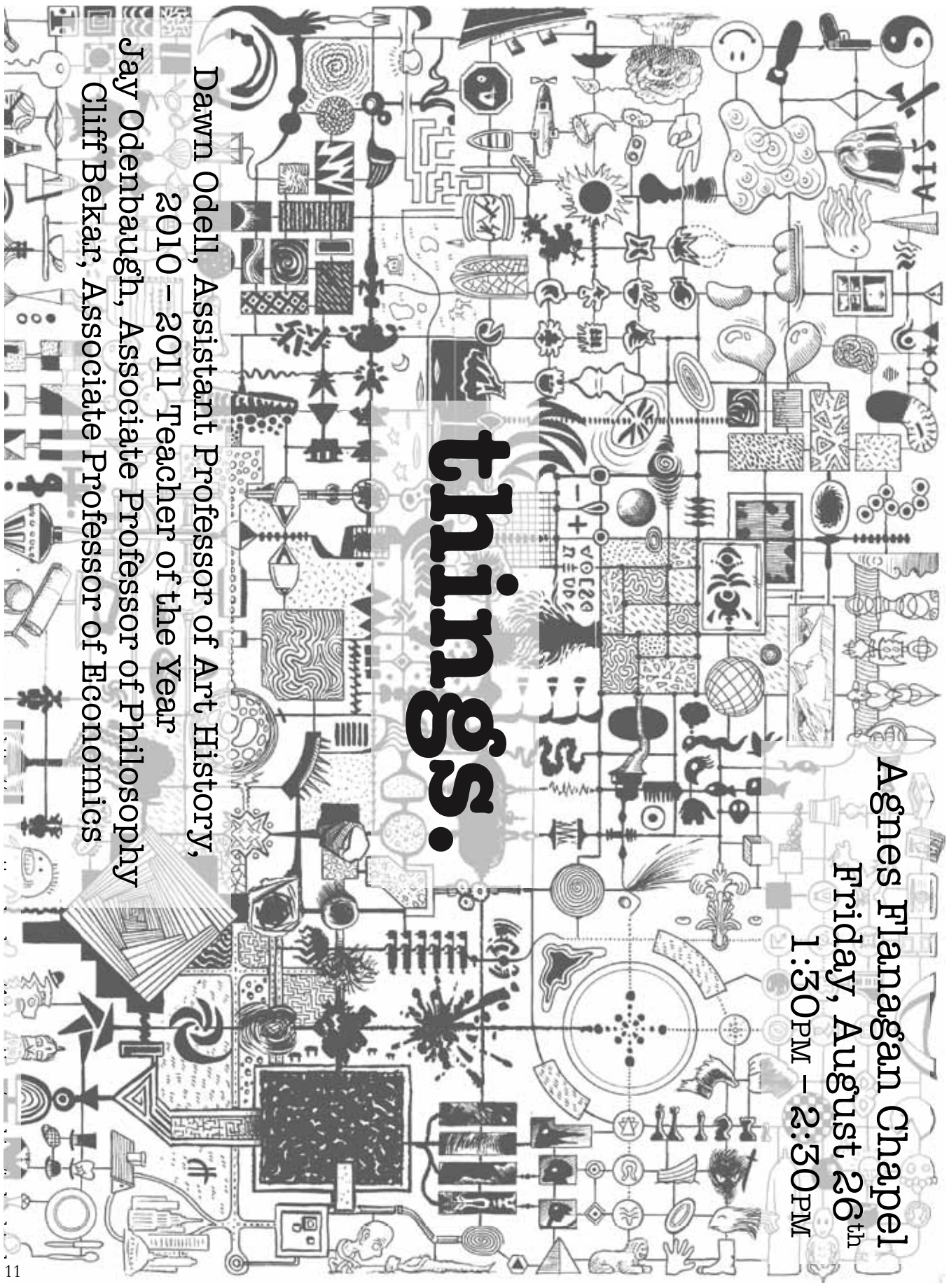
To keep the liberal arts liberal, meaning 'not illiberal' but not 'not conservative,' we bring together a variety of perspectives in considering our topic of things. Dawn Odell asks us to consider things in the context of art: art works, the making of art objects, artful activities, artifacts, and the artistic value of things. Jay Odenbaugh will challenge our ability to think abstractly – to think of things in the broadest possible sense of the term. And Cliff Bekar will introduce an empirical approach to things: economics studies how things are produced, exchanged, valued and distributed, and how human beings and more abstract things (corporations, nations) interact when engaged in such activities.

Inquiry in the liberal arts goes broad and deep. By introducing things to you, we introduce you to the breadth and depth of your year in *Exploration and Discovery*, your four years at Lewis & Clark College and a distinctly liberal path through the world.

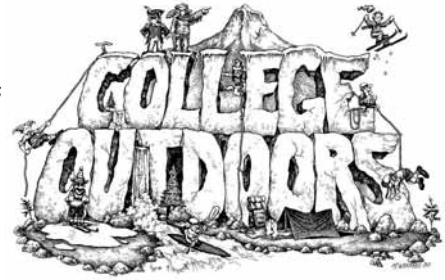
