FACULTY NEWS

Karen Gross is a recipient of the 2007-08 Arnold L. & Lois S. Graves Award in the Humanities. The award, given in alternate years to a young professor teaching at a liberal arts college in the West, recognizes excellence in teaching in the humanities. Professor Gross will use the award to attend a conference in Swansea, UK to present the research she is conducting on Chaucer and his Italian sources, and the intellectual exchanges between England and Italy during the later Middle Ages.

Pauls Toutonghi traveled to Latvia with the US State Department in March to lecture at three universities and give a reading. His novel, Red Weather, will be released in German in 2009.
