Apps:

If you have an iPhone, you may find the following apps useful for getting around/navigating in Berlin. Equivalent apps can be found for Android phones.

- BVG Fahrinfo (Free): The BVG is the organization that operates public transport in Berlin. This free app lets you plan trips, check departure times, and purchase tickets for immediate travel.
- VBB Bus & Bahn (Free): VBB is the umbrella organization that coordinates public transport for Berlin and the surrounding state of Brandenburg. This free app lets you plan trips, check departure times, and purchase tickets for immediate travel.
- Pocket Earth (\$2.99): A highly useful map application that allows you to download map data from OpenStreetMap along with Wikipedia entries. Very useful not only for finding your way around but also for finding information about local monuments, all without needing mobile internet access.
