Hillary introduces Eric Staab, Vice President of Admissions and Financial Aid

Enrollment/Financial Aid Presentation - Eric Staab:

Eric speaks about his background (30 years in Higher Education) and what brought him to Lewis & Clark. Eric was attracted to Lewis & Clark because of its academic excellence, commitment to International education, and dedication to sustainably.

For the first four months, here Eric has been evaluating and assessing the enrollment division and looking for what we can do better. First focusing on improving yields in this immediate admissions cycle. Our Applications this year are down about 8.5% (about 500 applications). It would be good to maintain or slightly improve our yield from 12% to 13% or 14% but also important is to increase our headcount and revenue.

Market trends and shrinking demographic shifts are creating strong pressures for of all higher education. Enrollment is on a decline and pricing is more competitive than ever. The more name recognition an institution has regionally and internationally the less of an impact these market pressures will have. Lewis & Clark has a phenomenally reputation both nationally and internationally. The average student travels 900 miles to come to Lewis & Clark, the national average is 100 miles. Financial Aid is more and more a factor. Students are deciding what is the best institution I can go to that I can afford to go to. In addition, families are thinking more about what is the return their investment, i.e. will my child have a job when they finish their education?

■BOA giving:

FY20 total gifts and pledges to date: \$22,033. 6 members have monthly recurring donations.

Participation: 19 out of the 21 have given (90%). Goal: 100% Participation.

■March 4th DAY OF GIVING

Generous donors have pledged \$100,000 to Lewis & Clark If we can secure 2,019 gifts from alumni, parents, students, faculty, staff, and friends from all three schools.

- Philanthropy Council is now two years old and is going strong. We are using a new software to enhance our reach out abilities and it is working well.
- ■FY20 Goal: Institution wide our goal this year is to raise 15 million. We are at 9.2 million now. CAS goal for the annual fund is 2.6 this year. Last year was 2.3.
